Luke has chaired the European First Year Experience conference; presented to the OECD in Paris on Learning Gain and chaired a UK national conference on 'Increasing Student Retention across Higher Education'. In 2019, he delivered a keynote on student engagement and quality enhancement at the University of Tsukuba and presented at the Japanese Association of Higher Education Research. He believes in a global approach to creativity and has developed international partnerships with colleagues at the University of Pittsburgh (Simulation in health care), Copenhagen Business School (Student engagement), North West Missouri State University (Student employment on campus), University of South Carolina (Transitions and the First Year Experience) and with Kennesaw State University (Assessment). In 2021, the Times/Sunday Times newspapers identified Abertay University as the No 1 UK University for Teaching Quality.
